Best Practice - II

Title: Indigenous Automation of Examination System

Goal:

- To maximise paperless communication
- To generate examination remuneration bill by automating the process
- To improve the processes involved in question paper setting & printing

The Context:

The need for shifting to paperless & faster communication through the College Information System was felt as the process of communicating information to about 400 faculty and 5500 students was becoming tedious & time consuming. The process of question paper setting needed to be simplified and made easy for the external examiners for faster receipt of the same by COE, since the number of question papers to be set has been increasing with the introduction of new courses each year. The increase in student strength & number of question papers to be set

meant an increase in examination remuneration claims which were generated manually and had to be verified before disbursement.

The Practice:

All Circulars relating to faculty by the COE office is uploaded in the College Information System with digital acknowledgement of having read it. The COE intimates about the issue of circulars in CIS through Group Messages. The entire process of Application for Examination, Examination fees amount, Hall ticket generation is automated and the student can view, verify and print them.

Fixed Templates for each code have been generated and sent to the examiners for question paper setting which are sent through thereby simplifying their work & minimising the errors and faster receipt of the question paper for scrutiny & printing.

Fixed Template for examination related remuneration claims have been created for quick and error free Claim generation and disbursement.

Evidence of Success:

- Paperless faster Communication, quick Receipt of question papers without transit loss, more time for scrutiny & printing of question papers, faster and simplified payment process

Problems Encountered and resources required:

- Faculty have to be motivated to view the circulars till it becomes part of routine
- Many Examiners have to be motivated to mail soft copy of question papers in the given template

Best Practice - III

Title: Mentoring of Students

Goal:

In an educational institution the prime stakeholders are undoubtedly the student community. It is essential to mould this human resource for the betterment of their future. A sound and healthy mind is the prerequisite for acquiring knowledge and resorting to knowledge management effectively. In this context there is a profound need to mentor the students and we equip them to face the various hurdles of life and exude self confidence in their future endeavours.

The Context:

The institution has an influx of students belonging to different strata of society and more so the first generation learners. The task of mentoring these students to undergo a hassle free tenure in the College with due focus on acquiring quality education and employability skills along with imbibing moral and ethical values is of a challenging nature. The strategies suitable for mentoring them have been thoughtfully devised to cater to the needs of individual students irrespective of their nature of background.

The Practice:

Mentoring of students belonging to all disciplines is carried out systematically and periodically. Potential candidates with due skill and knowledge, who have an inclination to progress are fine tuned through mentoring. Individual attention is provided by the College Counsellor on a case to case basis.

An interactive session by eminent Psychologists and Psychiatrists with a majority of students, dwelling upon stress management was carried out. The focus was on identifying nature of stress a student may undergo and the necessity to seek advice and counselling at the right juncture and the ways to handle stress was discussed threadbare.

Evidence of Success:

The usefulness of this interactive session could be prominently seen with the willing participation and level of involvement by the student fraternity. Several problems and obstacles faced by them were discussed and the solutions to such problems were provided on a case to case basis instilling confidence in their minds to confront such problems and overcome them successfully, thereby focusing on their studies and their future goals.

Problems Encountered and resources required:

- The process of mentoring in its initial stages did have its hiccups with a sceptical approach on the part of the students to spell out their problems. It was indeed a herculean task to convince them to open up their minds and assure them about the effectiveness of mentoring. Gradually this process gained momentum and the benefits of mentoring was realised and recognized to the fullest extent.
- Many more such interactive sessions dealing with student centric approaches necessitates the services of psychologists and other related experts, which in turn poses additional financial strain.

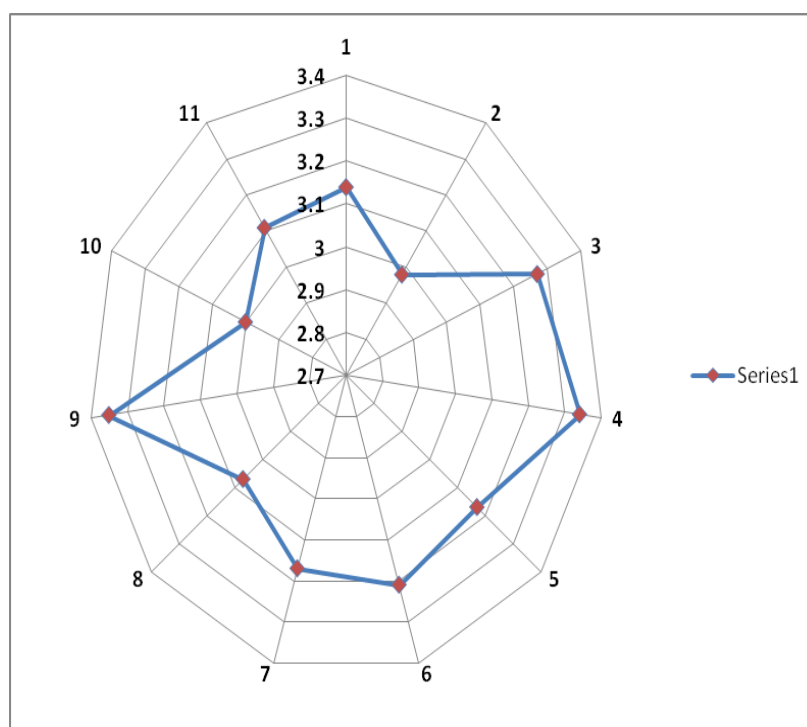
